Jesus Our Mediator

During the Christmas days our thoughts, centered on Jesus, have revealed to us a little of the great "mystery which hath been hidden from eternity in God," the mystery we now wish to consider in synthesis, in order to arouse in ourselves greater admiration for its "unfathomable riches."

The infinite distance between God and man, the impassable abyss, the breaking of every bond of friendship—all this was the tremendous consequence of sin. Then between God and man appeared the sweet Babe of Bethlehem; suddenly and completely the whole situation changes: distance is overcome, and across the abyss a wonderful bridge is erected which unites earth with heaven and re-establishes relations of intimacy between God and man. This bridge is Jesus, the "only Mediator between God and man," who "joins earth to heaven in a truly remarkable manner." In His office as Mediator, Jesus is really "at the center": He is the point of union between divinity and humanity. His mediation has all the qualifications necessary for perfectly pleasing God, since He Himself is true God; at the same time, because He is true man and, as such, represents the whole human race, Jesus can make worthy satisfaction to God for the entire debt of sinful mankind.

The divinity possessed by Jesus as the Word is united in His Person with the humanity He possesses as man. These two natures are not merely in juxtaposition, but they embrace each other; even more, they are united in one Person, the Person of the Incarnate Word, Jesus Christ, Our Lord. In Him and through Him, all mankind is readmitted to friendship with the heavenly Father. In Him all can find again the way to reach union with the Trinity.

The eternal Father deigned to reveal this wonderful mystery to St. Catherine of Siena: "It is My wish that you consider the bridge I have built in the Person of my only-begotten Son, and that you notice that it reaches from earth to heaven, because in Him the majesty of the divinity is united with the lowliness of your human nature. It was necessary to construct this bridge in order to repair the road which had become impassable and to open a passage across the trials of this world to eternal life."

"For it hath well pleased the Father that in [Jesus] all fullness should dwell, and that through Him He should reconcile all things unto Himself, making peace through the blood of His Cross, both as to the things that are on earth, and the things that are in heaven." Jesus accomplished His work as Mediator on Calvary, where He shed all His Blood as the price of our redemption. But His work began at Bethlehem, where the Word took, so to speak, that ineffable "giant's step" which brought Him from heaven to earth, which made Him true Man as well as true God.

The terrible abyss which sin had produced between God and man has been filled up by the child who opens His arms to us from the manger. All that sin had spoiled and destroyed is now, by the will of God, saved, "re-established in Christ." Oh! How spontaneous is the need to praise and adore when the Child Jesus is contemplated in this light! Here, tenderness and admiration are one!

The grace which Adam had received directly from God, we now receive only through Jesus, our Mediator; our whole supernatural life always comes through Him. If we wish to be united to God, we have no other means than to attach ourselves to Jesus, to pass through Him, our Mediator, our Bridge, our Way. (*Divine Intimacy* by Fr. The Key to Approaching the Mystery of Jesus

When [Jesus] was on the Cross, with the end near, while His mother stood below, yet nonetheless bound to Him in all the torment of her heart, hanging, waiting on a word from Him, He said to her, with John in mind, "Woman, behold thy son," and to the beloved disciple, "Behold thy mother," Surely, it must have been troubling. But in her heart, she must have sensed the meaning of that other sentence: "Woman, behold thy son." He was telling her to be quit of Him. He was now wholly engaged in that "hour" which had come, great and terrible and demanding everything. In the ultimate, solitary presence of God with the sins of the world laid upon Him, before God's justice, there He was indeed quite alone.

Mary stood ever by His side. All that befell Him she shared. Indeed His life was her life. But not in the sense of intellectual understanding: "The Holy Spirit"—how full of meaning is that word *the* in the message of the Angel of the Annunciation, how pregnant with the mystery and remoteness of God! —the Holy Spirit came upon her "from on high," that which is great beyond measure. She gave the Holy Spirit all she had: her heart, her honor, her blood, and all her power of love. She enclosed the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit grew out and over her. A remoteness came upon her Son; the Holy Spirit, in whom He lived, apart from her.

In the end, she could not understand Him. How could she understand the mystery of the living God? But she did what in a Christian sense is almost equal to understanding, which can be done only by that same divine power which makes understanding possible: she believed. If anything shows her grandeur, it is the words of her cousin Elizabeth: "Blessed art thou who hast believed!" It accounts for her more than the other two phrases: "And they understood not the word that He spoke unto them," and again, "Mary kept all these words in her heart."

Mary believed. It was demanded of her that she constantly renew this faith, that it might become ever firmer, more bare of supports—greater. She had faith greater than anyone has ever had. Abraham underwent a terrible test of his faith, but more was demanded of her than of Abraham. For the Holy One sprang from her, grew away from her, went on past her—the Holy One, who drew His being from a different order, apart from her.

Yet she did not make a natural womanly underestimation of His greatness due to having borne Him, and nourished Him, and seen Him in His helplessness. She did not give in to a mother's usual temptation to demand of her son that she always remain mother. Nor was she to mistake her love for Him when he went forth from the simplicity of her protection. Above all she believed this was as it should be; the will of God was thus being fulfilled. She chose to persevere, to follow, through the power of faith, every step her Son took in all its unfathomableness. That was the measureless quality of her greatness.

Every step the Lord took toward His divine destiny Mary took with Him—not in the way of understanding, but in the way of faith. Let us open ourselves up to this.
