Modestv

Perfect chastity presupposes an absolute dominion of spirit over matter. However, there is in us a disordered tendency toward sensible pleasure which is opposed to this dominion; even souls consecrated to God bear the treasure of chastity in earthen vessels, in the fragile vessel of flesh, which is attracted by satisfactions of the senses... "One who makes a vow to God of perfect chastity must struggle by prayer and penance, in order to preserve its integrity"—by prayer because no one can be chaste unless God grants it to him, by penance and mortification because the body must be subject to the spirit.

It is modesty which *moderates* and regulates all our actions, both interior and exterior, according to our vocation. St. Paul recommends this virtue to all Christians: "Let your modesty be known to all men." Souls consecrated to God are obliged to observe modesty more strictly, because they are called by their state of life to preserve the treasure of absolute chastity intact; therefore, they need to practice mortification of the senses more assiduously and delicately. They must be like men who, possessing material treasures of great value, take all necessary measures and precautions to protect them from thieves. "Brethren, be sober and watch," says St. Peter, for the enemy is always lying

The vow of chastity, by consecrating the body to God, also consecrates the senses. For this reason they must be freed from the base things of earth in order to be wholly employed in the service of God.

The more a soul aspires to the total gift of self and intimate union with God, the more its conduct must be imbued with perfect modesty-modesty of countenance, gesture, and manner. "Be modest in every action or conversation," St. Teresa of Avila instructs her daughters. St. Teresa Margaret of the Heart of Jesus "kept such a perfect restraint and guard over her faculties and senses that she refused herself every glance and every word which did not have in some way some reference to God." The golden rule of St. John of the Cross was to use the senses solely for the service and glory of God and to raise the heart to Him, which, in practice, means using them only as they are required for the accomplishment of one's duties or for an honorable or just purpose; "with this exception all must be left free for God." Therefore the soul must carefully guard its sight and hearing from vain curiosity, images, and news; for these encumber it uselessly and give entrance to impressions which are not entirely pure or holy.

Modesty, however, is not only a weapon of defense for chastity; it is the bulwark of the interior life. Only a soul who knows how to guard the senses is capable of recollecting itself interiorly in order to live in intimacy with God. By detaching the senses from earthly things, modesty concentrates and fixes them on God. "We put to death the curiosity of our eyes when, turning them away from all useless things, we fix them on ourselves, on the movements of our heart, and on the heart of Jesus." This is the positive value of modesty. Only one who loves God very much can impose such a discipline on himself.

Failure

We have looked into what sort of a presence Jesus was, at what was the character of His earthly existence. We thought to find the answer in considering Him as One Who "passed by." He was in the world, entered into the life of the world, into everything that makes it the kind of world it is. He took upon Himself the human condition, in its profoundest depths as well as its externals. He held back in nothing. He truly became "One of us, like us in all things except sin." But the manner in which He was all these things, the characteristic of His existence in the world of men, was that of someone passing by. And when we go deeply into ourselves we can feel that sublime unknown that was in Him. Put this same question once again, thus: What did all His dealings, and His struggles, and His doings add up to? And the answer is, they all took the shape of failure.

Is it not almost a precondition for failure that He who set out to be the Savior of the world should have been born in Palestine, no more than a tiny corner of the world of that time? No one of importance could really take it seriously. When Christ's accusers tried to advise as to the proper procedure in the matter, we mark the lack of esteem in his answer. "Am I a Jew?" asked Pilate.

And again, the place where He was born was that very bit of this small corner of the world which the Jewish people itself had the least regard for, Galilee. When Philip came to Nathanael saying, "We have discovered who it was Moses wrote of in his law, and the prophets too; it is Jesus the son of Joseph, from Nazareth," we read astonishment in the answer: "Can anything that is good come from Nazareth?" Anything worth taking seriously?

...In the sense that He might have achieved a clear victory over the powers of darkness. He did not win out. In the historical sense they defeated Him.

But at the same time He knew well that, in God's order, "I have mastered the world."

The abiding figure of Jesus' life is failure, defeat. Humanly speaking, there has never been a great personality, filled with the glories of the spirit and endowed with grace, who came to such a wretched end as He did. Unless we open ourselves to this fact, the figure of Our Lord and His earthly life may appear trivial and idyllic, and its immense majesty will escape us.

...Failure lies at the heart of the life of Christ. It points the way, like the notion of passage, to the understanding of His intimate self.

Being Jesus for Mary

If we are to love Our Lady as sons and daughters, we have a very holy Model to copy; and that is Jesus, Mary's Son, our divine Brother.

The greatest disciples of Mary are those who resemble Jesus the most in being Mary's own, as He was, and in loving her like a son, as He did. It is these who reach the point of being Jesus for Mary. In this way the highest kind of devotion to Mary is found only in one who has become transformed and identified with Jesus, whereby he can truthfully repeat with St. Paul, "I live now not with my own life, but with the life of Christ who lives in me."

It cannot be otherwise. To grow in the spiritual life means to make the old man—which is our selfishness—die within us, in order for Jesus to live there, who is the new man, by our adopting His sentiments, His way of life in our thoughts, words, affections, desires, and deeds.

The selfsame love of Jesus for His divine Mother thus becomes also the love of one who has reached this identification with Jesus, and this is so in the measure of one's conformity with Him. When a person is interiorly "one" with Jesus, he is also "one" with Jesus in loving Our Lady; although no one, not even all creatures together, could ever exhaust the infinite magnitude of Jesus' love for His Mother. It is something that will delight us forever in Paradise.
