The Education of Communion

The education given us by Communion, by Jesus in us, trains for love, calls forth frequent acts of love, and thereby leads us to all virtues. Jesus, by the intimate and striking manifestation of His love for us, teaches us to love Him. He convinces us that He gives us all He has, all He is; by the very excess of His love for us, He forces us to love Him. As a mother awakens love for herself in the heart of her child simply by loving it, so our Lord acts toward us.
It is impossible for anyone to bestow upon us a love for Jesus Christ or infuse it into our hearts. People may exhort us to love Him, but it is beyond human power to teach us how to love; we learn love by feeling it. This education of the heart belongs to our Lord alone, for He desires Himself alone to be its goal. He begins by giving to the communicant the sentiment of love, then the motive of love, and finally the impelling desire for the heroism of love. But this is learned only in Communion. “Except you eat the Flesh of the Son of man and drink His Blood, you shall not have life in you.” What life is meant but the life of love, that powerful life which has its source only in Jesus Himself?
Is it not on the day and in the act of Communion that we feel ourselves most greatly loved by Jesus? True, we weep with joy after our sins are forgiven; but the remembrance of them keeps us from being completely happy. Only in Communion is happiness to be found in its fullness; there only do we see and weigh all the sacrifices of Jesus Christ; there, overcome by so much love, we end by crying out from the depths of our heart: “my God, my God, how canst Thou love me so much!” And we rise from the Holy Table in a glow of love: “*Like lions with a breath of fire.*” We feel what measureless ingratitude it would be to give nothing in return for such goodness. At first we are overwhelmed by our nothingness; then, conscious that we are unable of ourselves to do anything, but strong in Him Who dwells within us, we go from virtue to virtue. Love so experienced always calls forth a corresponding devotion.
Love shows us what we have to do. It takes us out of ourselves, makes us emulate the virtues of our Lord, and withdraws us from this world into Him. Our education thus begun goes fast and far. The reason why so many Christians get no farther than the threshold of virtue is that they will not break the chains that hold them back and will not give themselves up confidently to our Lord’s guidance. They feel that if they go to Communion they will be unable to resist the love of Jesus and will be forced to give themselves in return. So they content themselves with books, with words, and do not dare turn to the Master Himself.

Justice & Religion

Justice leads us to render to each one what is his due. But when it is a question of justice to God, we can never succeed in giving Him all that we owe Him, in making Him a suitable return for all His gifts, in paying Him the worship and homage which are due His infinite Majesty. We can fulfill our obligations to others according to justice, but we cannot do so with regard to God. However much man does, it will always be far less than what justice demands. Therefore, justice to God creates in us an urgent need to give ourselves to Him without reserve, without measure, without calculations, in other words, to make a complete gift of ourselves to God, in an attempt to render Him all the homage of which He, by His grace, has made us capable.
Because our justice is insufficient, we should have recourse to Jesus “who of God is made unto us. . . justice,” not only in the sense that He justified us from sin, but also in that He came upon earth to give the Father, in the name of all mankind, the worship worthy of Him. Therefore, we should seek in Jesus, in His wounds and His precious Blood, all that will make up for our insufficiency, and pay our debt to God; and we shall find it superabundantly. Even though we have consecrated ourselves to the service and worship of God, we are always useless servants, always his great debtors; this, however, should not discourage us, but should serve to stimulate us never to lessen, never to draw back in our dedication to God. At the same time, it ought to urge us to appeal with immense confidence to Jesus, our Savior and Mediator.

“*I invoke You, omnipotent Father, by the charity of Your omnipotent Son; nor do I know of any other intercessor, if not this One who made Himself a propitiation for our sins. I beseech You through Him, the High Priest, true Pontiff and Good Shepherd, who offered Himself as a sacrifice and gave His life for His flock; I pray to You through Him who is seated at Your right hand interceding for us, to give me the grace to bless You and praise You and glorify You together with Him, with intense compunction of heart, with many tears, and with great reverence. He is my advocate with You, God the Father; He is the sacred Victim, pleasing to You, perfect, offered in the odor of sweetness and acceptable to You,*” ~ St. Augustine

Interesting Fact About Our Church

The Pope is protected by the Swiss Papal Guard. Wearing uniforms designed by Michelangelo and commonly armed with halberds, they are capable of using heavier weapons if needed. Each member is Catholic, male, and Swiss, and must complete military training in Switzerland. They must demonstrate good conduct and be at least five-foot-eight in height. Those who are chosen are granted a private audience with the pope along with their families. In extreme circumstances, they are expected to guard the Holy Father with their lives. The Swiss Papal Guard is the oldest active military unit in continual existence since 1506.
