

Method of Hearing Mass by Meditation on the Seven Words Upon the Cross

At the *Introit*.—Jesus prays for His executioners: *Father*, forgive them, for they know not what they do.

Ask Jesus to forgive you all your sins, for you are more guilty than His executioners, having crucified Him even though you knew Him better.

At the Prayers.—The good thief says to Jesus: Lord, remember me when Thou shalt come into Thy kingdom. And Jesus answers him: Amen I say to thee, this day thou shalt be with Me in Paradise.

The good thief, in his gratitude, unites his suffering to the suffering of Jesus. Repeat his prayer for yourself for the hour of your death and for this present moment.

At the Offertory.—Jesus gives Saint John to Mary for her son: Woman, behold thy son.

John is thus to take the place of Jesus as her son, and with him all mankind receives Mary for a Mother. Thank our Lord for having given her to you; pray this good Mother to give you her tender love and to guide you in all things to the service of Jesus.

At the Preface.—Behold thy Mother.

With these words Jesus gives His Mother to be our mother. Thank your loving Savior for the beautiful title of Child of Mary, which gives you a claim to her mother-love and to all her goods and possessions.

At the Elevation.—I thirst.

Adore Jesus Who, prays His Father that He may suffer still more for love of mankind, and cries out to Him: "I thirst! I thirst for hearts, thirst for Thy glory.'

Slake this burning thirst of Jesus for suffering, for the world's salvation, for reparation to the deeply offended Majesty of God, by suffering yourself and making reparation with Him.

At the Pater noster.—My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken Me? Eli, Eli, lamma sabacthani?

Adore the holy and unspeakable desolation of the Savior, suffered by Him to expiate your own criminal abandonment of God and His holy law; promise Him that you will never again forsake Him.

At the Communion.—It is consummated. . . . Father, into Thy hands I commend my spirit. With these words, Jesus dies.

Adore Him as, in this Holy Communion, He delivers into the hands of men His Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, all that He is. Unite yourself with the priest and adore Jesus taken down from the Cross and given into the arms of His holy Mother. Do you also receive Him and press Him to your heart; never let Him leave you. In the Footsteps of Jesus

Saint Athanasius says, "Fit your footsteps to his." How do you fit your footsteps to someone else's? I think one element is that you have to trust the person. You don't want to follow the footsteps or "fit" your footsteps to those of someone you do not completely trust. Here we are talking about the footsteps of the God-Man. A child has the instinct to know that there is something very wonderful about setting its little steps in the footprint of a father. We did this as little children. I know I did. I have seen children walking in the snow, trying to fit their little feet into the footprints of their father and walk in those same steps. I think this is a very deep spiritual instinct expressed by them in a child's way, hopefully to be expressed more and more by us in a spousal way. Where do we want to go except where he is going? We know where he is going. He is always going to do the will of his Father. How strange if we would want to go another way.

He is always going forward to save us. How strange if we were not that eager to be saved in the little events of every day. His footsteps were on the way to the Father. They were unflagging. He always kept going. His footsteps were always unswerving. They went straight ahead in the will of the Father. He knew where he was going.

For ourselves, we know that our steps are quite often flagging. We lag. We sit down. We get tired. What are we to do when our footsteps are flagging? There is a simple answer. We get up. Sometimes we become discouraged in a prideful way and we think, "Well, what is the use?" What we are really saying is, "I don't want to make the effort to get up." For us to have unflagging steps fitted to his, we have to be always getting up, because of our weakness, our sinfulness. It could be a wonderful thing indeed never to fall, never to flag, but it is a wonderful thing to get up. This can be a true aspiration for the poor sinners we are: that our footsteps become more unflagging according to how often and how quickly we have gotten up.

Then the second consideration: he was unswerving, he went straight on. At this time of the Church year, we are more acutely aware that we often swerve off a path that is too straight for us, too narrow. The very word is almost onomatopoeic: swerve, go off to the side. Either because of illness or because of overindulgence, persons swerve in their walk. We know we swerve sometimes. So what do we do then? We return to the straight path. We realize by God's enlightenment that we have swerved off the path of our resolve, we have swerved off the way of charity and love, we have swerved off the way of fidelity, and with God's grace, we come back.

The third point is related to both of these: how do we become unflagging? It is by penance. That is the only way. We have to make reparation. If we have been flagging by sitting down to rest by the roadside instead of going on, we have to use effort to get up. It can seem very inviting just to sit there or to continue swerving. With God's grace, we have to accept penance and inflict penance on ourselves so that we can return, and can fit our footsteps to his. (Excerpt from A Time of Renewal by Mother Mary Francis, PCC)
