Interior Silence

Holy Scripture says, "In the multitude of words there shall not want sin. He that hath no guard on his speech shall meet with evils." The rule of life of a consecrated soul, even if she lives in the world, should always provide for the practice of silence; and if, because of the demands of her duties, it is absolutely impossible for her to observe fixed times of silence, it is indispensable that she hold fast to this principle: to speak as little as possible with creatures in order to be able to speak as much as possible with God. She must, therefore, accustom herself to keeping control over her words, thus avoiding loquaciousness, idle chatter, prolonged conversations, and excessive exchange of confidences. The same norm which governs the use of the senses governs also the use of speech—it is to be used only in the measure required by duty or charity. Of course, it is certainly licit to talk for the purpose of taking some just alleviation or recreation, but
The Book Thief always with moderation and within reasonable limits.

However, it is not enough to observe exterior silence; we must also strive for interior silence, that is, silence of the interior senses—the memory, imagination, sensitive feelings, thoughts, recollections of the past and useless conjectures about the future.

"If any man think himself to be religious, not bridling his tongue...this man's religion is vain," which is to be understood, says St. John of the Cross, "no less of inward speech than of outward."

God Himself says to the soul desirous of divine intimacy, "Hearken, O daughter, and see, and incline thy ear, and forget thy people and thy father's house." Sister Elizabeth of the Trinity makes the following comment on this verse, "In order to listen we must forget our 'father's house'; that means, whatever pertains to the natural life.... To forget our 'people' seems to me more difficult; for by 'people' is meant that world which forms, as it were, part of ourselves. It includes our feelings, memories, impressions, and so forth. In a word, it is *self*. We must forget it, give it up, and when the soul has broken with it, and is wholly delivered from all it means, 'the King greatly desires is beauty.'"

The beauty of a recollected soul is the unity of her spirit, which is not divided and dissipated among creatures but is entirely concentrated on God. Then God takes pleasure in her and often manifests Himself to her, transforming her recollection, that is, her "silence" and making it divine, for "the knowledge of Him is in divine silence."

This total silence, both exterior and interior, disposes the soul to know and listen to God who dwells within her: "One word spoke the Father, which Word was His Son, and this Word He speaks ever in eternal silence, and in silence must it be heard by the soul"; and Sister Elizabeth of the Trinity exclaims: "O eternal Word, utterance of my God, I desire to spend my life in listening to You!" This is the fundamental occupation of a soul who wishes to be a "perfect praise of glory" of the Blessed Trinity: to live interiorly in continual silence, listening to and adoring God present within her, and exteriorly, being and doing only what the divine Word indicates from moment to moment.

From a Sermon by Saint Francis de Sales

St. John the Baptist told us, "I am the voice of Him who cries out in the desert: 'Make straight the way of the Lord!' " Please note this glorious saint's perfect humility. The more people pursued him, the more he withdrew and lowered himself in his nothingness, always rising thereby to a higher degree of humility. O noble virtue of humility! Not without reason is it called the foundation of all virtues. Without it, there is none. It may not be the preeminent virtue—charity or love of God surpasses it in dignity and excellence—yet these two virtues have such mutual affinity that one is never found without the other.

Since it is to the point, I will relate to you a beautiful sketch on this subject which I read with pleasure in the recently published Lives of the Fathers. The author has gathered these lives diligently and carefully. He relates that many of these good religious had at one point assembled and were talking together familiarly in a spiritual conference. One of them was highly praising obedience; another, charity; a third, patience. Hearing what all his brothers said about these virtues, one of them added: "As for myself, it seems that humility is the first and most necessary of all." He made the following comparison which is my sermon here: "Humility and charity are united like John the Baptist and Our Lord. Humility is the forerunner and the precursor of charity, as St. John the Baptist was of the Saviour. It prepares the way; it is the voice crying out: 'Make straight the way of the Lord.' And just as John the Baptist went before the Messias, so also must humility come in order to empty hearts that they might then receive charity, for that can never dwell in a soul in which humility has not first prepared the lodging for it."

In declaring that he was only a voice, how could St. John humble himself more? For the voice is only a breath, an exhalation into the air which produces some little sound and then disappears entirely. In this way the glorious St. John humbled himself to the very depths of his nothingness.
