The Mystery of the Cross

Good Friday is the day which invites us more than any other to "enter into the thicket of the trials and pains . . . of the Son of God," and not only with the abstract consideration of the mind, but also with the practical disposition of the will to accept suffering voluntarily, in order to unite and assimilate ourselves to the Crucified. By suffering with Him, we shall understand His sufferings better and have a better comprehension of His love for us, for "the purest suffering brings with it the most intimate and the purest understanding;" and "no one feels more deeply in his heart the Passion of Christ than one who has suffered something similar." With these dispositions let us accompany our Lord during His last day on earth.

The atrocious martyrdom, which within a few hours will torture His body, has not yet begun, and yet the agony of Jesus in the Garden of Olives marks one of the most sorrowful moments of His Passion, one which best reveals the bitter sufferings of His soul. His most sacred soul finds itself immersed in inexpressible anguish; it is extreme abandonment and desolation, without the slightest consolation, either from God or from man. The Savior feels the weight of the enormous burden of all the sins of mankind; He, the Innocent One, sees Himself covered with the most execrable crimes, and made, as it were, the enemy of God and the target of the infinite justice which will punish all our wickedness in Him. Of course, as God, Jesus never ceased, even in the most painful moments of His Passion, to be united to His Father; but as man, He felt Himself rejected by Him, "struck by God and afflicted." This explains the utter anguish of His spirit, much more sorrowful than the dreadful physical sufferings which await Him; explains the cruel agony which made Him sweat blood; explains His complaint, "My soul is sorrowful even unto death." Whereas before He had so ardently desired His Passion, now that His humanity finds itself facing the hard reality of the fact, deprived of the sensible help of the divinity, which seems not only to withdraw, but even more, to be angry with Him, Jesus groans: "My Father, if it be possible, let this chalice pass from Me!" But this anguished cry of human nature is immediately lost in that of the perfect conformity of Christ's will to the Father's: "Nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt."

From the Pastor

Holy Week begins today with Palm Sunday. It is the holiest time of the liturgical year. During this week we celebrate the redemptive work of Christ – His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. In order to help you to profit spiritually from this week, find below some suggestions:

- 1. If you haven't yet gone to confession this Lent, make the time to do so. Even if you are not conscious of having committed any mortal sins since your last good confession, a well-made confession will better dispose you to receive the graces Our Lord wants to give you at this time.
- Go to Mass and receive Holy Communion on the days it is possible to do so.
 - On Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday the Masses are at the regularly scheduled times. See elsewhere in the bulletin for the rest of the Holy Week schedule.
- 3. If you have been negligent in keeping your Lenten resolutions, make an extra effort to keep them this week.
- Keep electronic entertainment to a minimum internet, TV, video games, etc.
- 5. Do a little fasting, and/or abstain from some favorite food. Note: Good Friday is a day of fasting for those between the ages of 18 and the completion of their 59th birthday. Abstinence from meat is obligatory on that day for all of those 14 and older.
- 6. Do practice religious devotions: make the Stations of the Cross (if you can't do it in church, do it at home), meditate especially on the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary, read the story of the Passion of Our Lord from any one of the Gospels, spend some time in private prayer before Our Eucharistic Lord, etc.
- 7. Practice greater kindness and patience with the people you live with and work with. Good deeds and acts of charity are always in order. Try to be mindful of the poor in some concrete way, e.g., making a donation to your church's poor program.

April 9, Palm Sunday: palms will be blessed and distributed at the beginning of the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Those who attend the 8:00 a.m. Mass may pick up palms at any time during the following week.

April 15, Holy Saturday: Tenebrae begins at 9 a.m. Confessions immediately following Tenebrae. Please note a change in this year's schedule from previous years. The Easter Vigil will begin at 10:30 p.m. This will allow us to begin Mass at midnight.

April 16, Easter Sunday: The usual Sunday schedule
